3 次の英文の作者は、アメリカ人の心理カウンセラーです。この英文を読み、以下の問いに答えなさい。(30点)

Several years ago, a father called to ask me if I would see his 23-year-old son, Dwight, for consultation. The father, Bernard, was worried because Dwight kept going to college and dropping out, getting jobs and losing them. Bernard reported that his son just seemed unhappy and directionless. I told the father that if Dwight wanted help, he could contact me and I would be happy to schedule an appointment. Several hours later, Dwight called.

When I saw him, I understood his father's (A). Dwight didn't look depressed. Rather, he looked more empty or sad. He said he wasn't happy with the way his life was going but didn't really know what to do about it.

When I took Dwight's history, his background seemed simply uneventful except for his parents' divorce, which had (B) when he was about ten. Since the divorce, Dwight said, he'd had a good relationship with both of his parents and there didn't seem to be much conflict between them. In his youth there was no significant trauma, no history of depression from either parent.

I told Dwight that I was struck by the fact that his father made the (C) call. Usually, the mother is the most worried; she is the one who makes the first call to a therapist like me. So I asked him about his relationship with his father. In reply, Dwight told me that he and his father had always been very close. "He was the one who would read me bedtime stories," he said.

From the age of about seven on, the father and the son would go camping every summer. "I looked forward to those trips all year," Dwight said. "When I was about ten or eleven, Dad began to worry a lot, first, about how I was doing following the divorce. Then, several years later, he also worried a lot about my younger sister who seemed to be (D) his control. During that time, he even worried a lot about his business. I still looked forward to our camping trips, and I knew how much he loves me, but he just never seemed happy. It was not easy for me to see him in such pain."

Now let me ask you, dear reader: how would you advise Dwight or Bernard if you were me?

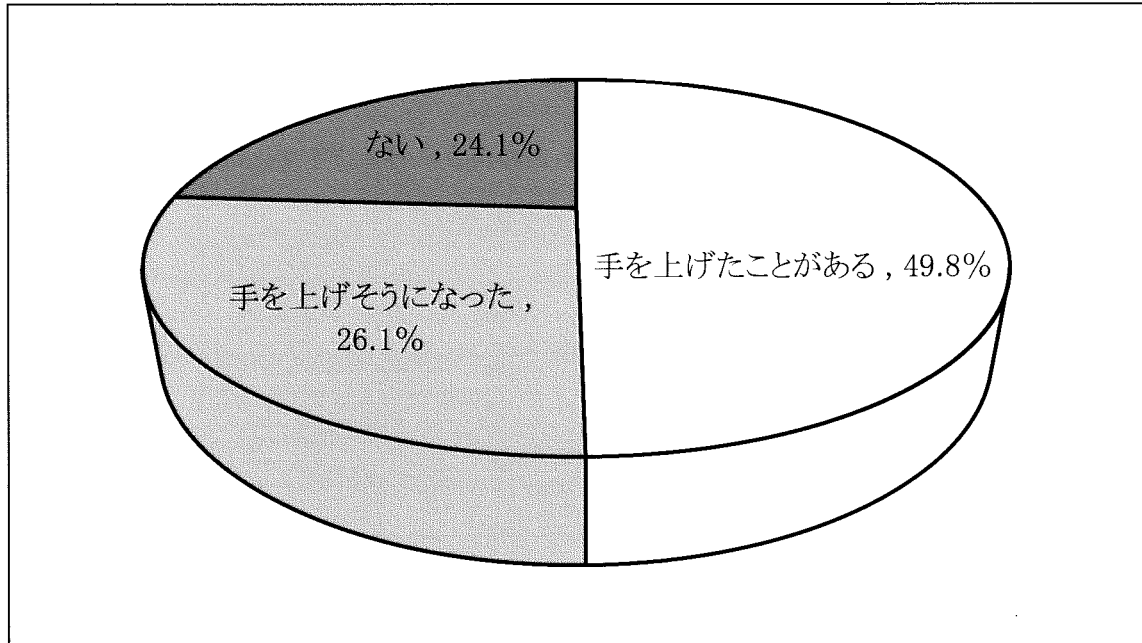

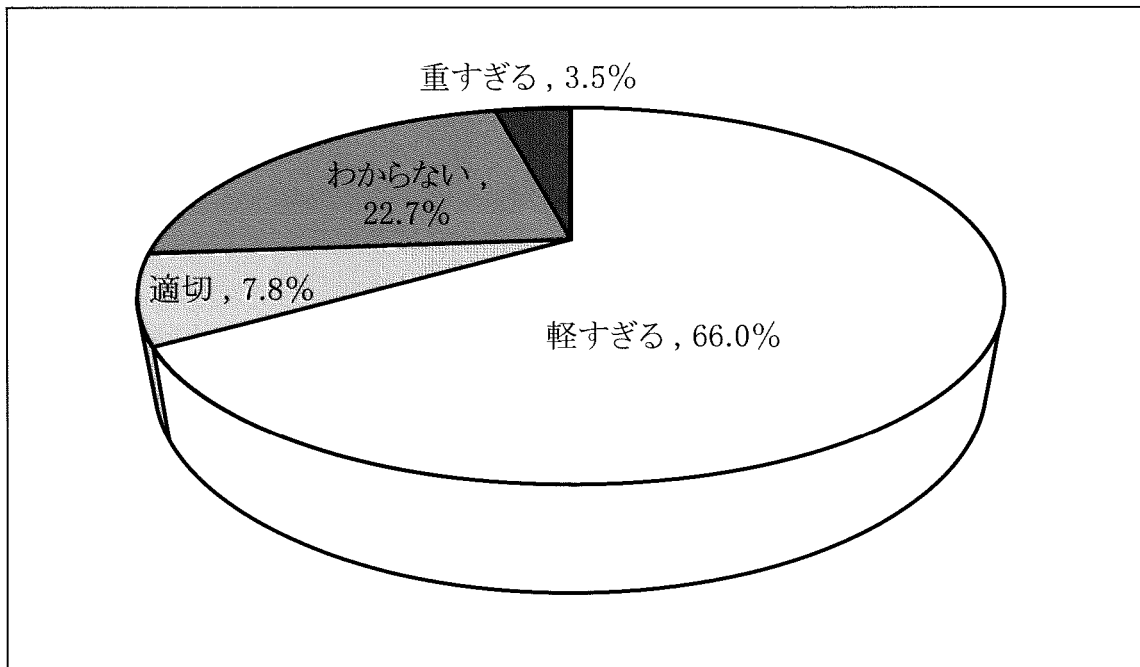
(2) 本文中の下線部の問いに対し、あなたならどのように答えますか。50 語程度の英文で自由に書きなさい。
