1 次の英文を読み、下の設問に答えなさい。(後に星印[*]が付いている語句に は英文の後に注がある。)

Since ancient times, humor and laughter have helped calm people's minds, smoothing human relations all over the world. Humor lightens our burdens, inspires hope, connects us to others and keeps us alert. Nothing works faster or can more dependably bring the human spirit and body back into balance than a good laugh. There is a great deal of meaning inherent in long-established adages* such as: "humor is mankind's greatest blessing"; "humor brings insight and tolerance"; "what soap is to the body, laughter is to the soul"; "laughter is the best medicine" and "good fortune comes to the door of people who laugh."

In famous playwright* and actor Moliere's (1622—1673) satirical* French comedies of the 17th century, there's a healthy sense of humor that has long entertained ordinary citizens in western countries. In Japan as well, short satirical Japanese poetry from the early modern period (senryu) and comic stories (rakugo) have had the same effect.

It would be shallow to say that this type of entertainment was something that only diverted commoners' attention from the problems of their societies like poverty, social injustice, class distinction and oppression. In a much deeper sense, ordinary citizens must have felt laughter was necessary to (2) triumph over hardship and head toward a bright future.

- (A), humor is sometimes jeering* and despicable*, disclosing vicious and inhumane aspects of life. But the essence of laughter does not exist in such humor. I sense something "sick" in Japanese comic dialogs (manzai) of late. From what I have seen and heard about these shows, I have concluded that recent manzai contain unhealthy and harmful humor.
- (B), many comedians make jokes at the expense of senior citizens, the underprivileged and other disadvantaged groups. They tease and ridicule

people who are weak. This verbal harassment is often directed at a person's physical appearance, ethnic origin or occupation. Therefore, the term "sadistic comedy" can be appropriately used to describe *manzai*. These sadistic *manzai* are a far cry from the time-honored healthy satirical spirit that invites spontaneous laughter. They seem to be devoid of feeling and so repugnant* that they have no value. This type of comedy is really about denial and destructiveness.

What worries me most—in addition to this negative tendency—is the almost total lack of humor regarding satire of Japan's hierarchy, politicians and bureaucrats. (C), I am afraid this tendency reflects political indifference and a sense of helplessness prevalent among Japanese.

Unhealthy and harmful humor has become both a symptom and a cause of a malaise* of triviality and foolishness currently troubling Japanese society.

(D), the majority of Japanese viewers accept this, as if to say, "If it's on TV, it must be OK!"

Yes, stress and worry changed my life for the better. I have to say that stress was making my life a living hell while I was working in a famous London advertising agency called Alfred Pemberton, Ltd.

At first, I loved my work, training to be an advertising account executive. I studied press, television and many other kinds of advertisement. I thought my job would be very interesting as I would be presenting my advertising agency's ideas to important clients such as Johnson & Johnson or the Wellcome Foundation. I was wrong.

When my training was completed, I was told I would be working in the newly established Foreign Department. It was responsible (1) advertising our clients' products in African, European and Asian countries.

I regret ______ that when I was first introduced to the manager of the department, Mr. Crattenden, I disliked him on sight. Actually, with his cold blue eyes, long nose and two strange rows of pointed teeth, he looked just like a shark in human form! His first words were, "Your desk is over there, Powle. I'm a hard worker and I expect you to (A) (B), too. You're (2) charge of the foreign media." He looked at me without smiling and pointed to a small desk just in font of his.

My job was just as horrible (3) my boss. I had to work out the cost of advertising space in foreign magazines and newspapers. The calculations had to be in English pounds and in foreign currencies. Then complicated commissions* and discounts had to be worked out. I hated it. In those days, there were no computers or calculating machines. I just had to work out everything in my head. It was very, very difficult for me because mathematics was my (C) point. This was not the job I had been trained (4).

Often, as I was struggling over some difficult figures, I would hear

Mr. Crattenden shout at me, "Haven't you completed the newspaper advertising figures for the Wellcome South Africa account? You're so slow. I must have these figures first thing tomorrow morning. Do you hear that, Powle?" That meant I had to stay up working until late at night without even having time for dinner. Actually, Crattenden caused me so much stress, I didn't have any appetite for dinner.

Another time, I remember I was trying to buy advertising space in a Hong Kong newspaper. As I was speaking, I could sense Mr. Crattenden listening very critically to my conversation as he sat just behind me.

When I'd finished, he shouted at me (5) his harsh voice that always made me nervous. "Powle, can't you speak properly (6) the phone? You're the *buyer* of space. You have the advantage. You have to speak in a strong businesslike way. You're not a mouse. If you don't improve, I will have to get a new foreign media manager." Being called a mouse made me very angry. I turned in my seat and looked straight into his cold shark's eyes.

I shouted back, "I'm not a mouse. I've done my best, but instead of thanks, all I get is criticism. You can get a new media manager because I don't want to work for you anymore."

On hearing this, he was so surprised he didn't know what to say (7) first. Then he tried to apologize by saying that he was really trying to help me. In fact, I had been thinking of leaving for some time. I was heading for a nervous breakdown. When I hear of Japanese office workers suffering heart attacks or killing themselves because of stress, I feel so sorry for them. Perhaps, like me, they have bosses with no human feelings.

Yes, they tried to persuade me to stay on, but I had really made up my mind that advertising was not the life for me. I resigned (8) Alfred Pemberton, Ltd.

My parents were very upset by my decision. They really thought I had a good job. My mother asked me what I was going to do. She was not very

happy when I said, "I'm going to New York. Don't try to change my mind as I've already bought a one-way ticket on a Cunard passenger ship." My brother met me for dinner. He told me that without friends, money and information, life would be very difficult for me in America.

Well, he was quite right. But although my life has been very different from what I might have expected, I've had a really wonderful time so far. I made the right decision. But if Mr. Crattenden had not called me a mouse, I might still be in England doing a job I hated! The stress he caused me made me answer him back and leave my job.

Yes, stress helped me to be a success.
